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Janet Markham's MA

On Saturday, August 24th CAAE celebrated Janet Markham's achievement in obtaining an MA in Cultural Astronomy and Astrology from the University of Wales. The lively potluck and great evening was filled with accolades for our teacher, mentor and past CAAE President. After a couple of years out of the CAAE loop, I was impressed by the growth, quality and stability that the organization has achieved. Former students have become well-established teachers, there is a whole new crop of interesting students as well as the familiar faces of long-time contributing and dedicated astrologers.



Janet had been my first CAAE teacher back in the mid-nineties when a fellow Wiccan Tarot reader and Astrologer friend, to our amazement, discovered an Astrology course in the Toronto District School Board continuing education catalogue. We drove all the way out to a high school in Etobicoke, a distant planet from downtown Toronto and there was Janet, a great teacher from the get-go. Three levels, many courses, conferences, workshops and newsletters later, I was thrilled to be honouring Janet's latest achievement.

Of course I had to find out more. Last Friday I met with Janet in her backyard to get the full story on the minting of the MA. The path of this journey is full of rich encounters, twists and turns.

The MA Begins

PS: How did the MA come about?

JM: The first CAAE graduation was what really brought it home for me. I stood up there saying to the graduates that this was a special moment for Canadian Astrology. You should be thinking about ways to carry on moving forward. And I've started an MA. Once I had put it out there, I thought I had better do it!

At various times before then I had looked into the MA. It is offered through the Sophia Centre for the Study of Cosmology in Culture at the University of Wales, Lampeter Campus, by distance learning. The faculty includes astrologers such as Liz Greene, Bernadette Brady and Nicholas Campion, head of the program. Potentially very exciting. But then I thought: *It will be a lot of work. Do I really want to go back to university? What do I have to prove?*

Then in the spring of 2009, I saw another advertisement and suddenly I emailed Nick while I was up at the cottage one weekend. He emailed me back and by the Monday I had a game plan of how I was going to apply. A degree was a requirement, but if it was in a subject other than English (the program is in the Faculty of Arts) you also need to submit evidence of your writing style. My degree is in Mathematics, so I submitted articles I had written over the years which also included one which Christina Becker and I had written for NCGR on Astrology and Alchemy. On the basis of these, I was accepted.

The Program

There is the opportunity to take the MA full time or part time. On a full time basis, you complete six modules over one year (intense) and then you complete a 20,000 word dissertation during the second year. Part time you have to complete at least two modules a year plus then do the dissertation. Part time is the way most people go, and the way I went.

Of the six modules, two are compulsory: Introduction to Cultural Astronomy and Astrology, and Research Methods. After that I took the History of Astrology – starting with the origins of astrology in Mesopotamia and following developments through Greek, Egyptian and Roman times, through to the Renaissance and the current day.

There was a large amount of material to be covered. Every two weeks during term time there were on-line seminars with a chance to interact with the tutors and other students from around the world. Sharing ideas about Plato and the soul with Liz Greene was daunting to say the least. The program has definitely developed even in the brief 3 years since I first became involved. When I started in September, 2009, there were about 20 students in total. Now it is full, with around seventy-five MA and PhD. students.

The program taught me a lot about the rigour of academic writing and certainly improved my research skills. Another module I took was on the idea of sacred landscapes such as Stonehenge. What differentiates sacred landscape? With a church, is it sacred when you actually walk through the doorway? Just because a space is sacred to one group or religion, does that make it sacred for everyone? This allowed for a framework of how to view all ancient monuments.

Another module I took was Cosmology, Magic and Divination which explores magic back to the times of Egypt and Hermes Trismegistus. After delving into the past I then moved into Archaeoastronomy, a relatively new field. This area pulls together archaeology and astronomy and is the area I chose to do my dissertation on. Psychological Perspectives with Liz Greene was my final module and gave yet another slant. It covered the whole history of the psyche from when it first began to be explored by Plato, up to Freud and Jung, and then on to James Hillman and Archetypal Psychology.

The Dissertation

PS: How long was the dissertation and how did you do it? How did you "distill" it?

JM: My dissertation was 20,000 words long. The learning system is very English, certainly at the MA level, and was a relatively handsoff approach. Being 3,000 miles away you are also a bit separate to begin with. Before my MA year, there were only one or two students graduating per year. In my year going forward, there were suddenly a lot of people writing their dissertations.

This initiated the need for a 'dissertation' group with online meetings where people could bounce ideas off each other. Just before the first one of these, in February 2013, Bernadette Brady emailed me and said, Seeing as how you're close to submitting (I must have oversold to Nick how far along I was!), how would it be if you gave an overview on where you are at? This put me on the spot but was the jump start I needed and, with a lot of hard work, I was most surprised to find I was actually the first of my year to graduate in July 2013.

PS: Did you have to physically travel to the university?

JM: There is a summer school for a week once a year, usually in June, held at the Bath Royal Literary and Scientific Institute. This also includes a field trip. The first year I attended we went to Glastonbury and took a tour. About twenty to twenty-five people from around the world showed up. You certainly met a lot of interesting people but it is, of course, optional.

Visiting Sacred Spaces

PS: On Saturday you talked a bit about going down to the sacred landscape in Ohio and to the petroglyphs in Peterborough. Can you say more about that?

JM: There are so many sacred spots around the world and we were encouraged to find at least one, close to home. The petroglyphs north of Peterborough are ancient carvings on sacred rocks and a hidden gem in the Canadian landscape. No one knows where they came from. Why the rocks and what is the significance of the symbols? It poses a lot of questions and was one area I looked into. The petroglyphs were sacred to the North American people. There is water running under sacred rocks, representing the unconscious; and the land and the sky. This fits with what Mircea Eliade talks about in his exploration of the landscape and the philosophy of religion.

One of the biggest things that every student got out of this whole degree – I think we would all agree – was the idea of culture. "Culture" means that we live in the bubble of our own culture in our own time. When you're looking at past cultures you have to have a language with which you can say, I'm here now and I am always going to look at things through my lens.

How do I get back and understand what these people could have possibly meant? This was a big part of my dissertation. In my dissertation on the native North American culture, the Hopewell Culture (100 BCE to 400 CE) in Ohio, which is oral, the question was What did they leave behind and how can we evaluate it? They left all these gigantic geometrically constructed earthwork sites (some miles wide) spread along Ohio rivers, along with thousands and thousands of precious artifacts, made from materials imported from all across North America. The most famous of these is the Newark Earthworks site. How did this culture suddenly appear, go through an extraordinary expansion and then disappear? The material record is there but how do we correctly evaluate it's meaning?

The most famous is an octagonal earth construction linked by a straight pathway to a perfect circle in Newark, Ohio. This whole area encloses the 'Mound Builders golf and country club' to give you an idea of how big it is. I met with the curator of the Ohio Museum in Columbus, Brad Lepper, who put me in touch with members of the Ohio Historical Society. These people were most helpful in giving me insight on the history of the area. Sixty miles due south of the original octagon site in Newark is exactly the same construction altered by ninety degrees. Why did the Hopewell build these constructions? The octagons align with the standstill of the moon which occurs every 18.6 years. But the tantalizing question remains – did the Hopewell build these constructions deliberately to align with lunar standstills or is it simply a coincidence?

The Tie-In with Astrology

PS: The dissertation. What is the tie-in with Astrology?

JM: There really isn't one. One of the first graduates in the MA program stood up and said I'm one of the only people who is still a practicing astrologer at the end of this. Other people seem to branch off into other directions such as sacred landscapes, exploring ancient texts, studies in cosmology, divination, magic and so forth. There is a lot more out there to explore and in some ways astrology is only one of many ways of looking at the stars and the universe. To me though, it ended up presenting an even stronger case for astrology. Astrology goes back to Mesopotamia. The first birth chart together with an interpretation was cast around 410 BCE. Maybe there are a variety of ways of looking at the sky and different bonds, but every civilization seems to be connected to it.

PS: How did you develop a bond with Astrology?

JM: I was born in the north of England overlooking Pendle Hill ,where witches lived in the 17th century and were then matched to Lancaster, the county town, to be tried and hung in the biggest witch hunt in the British Isles.

Very close by was Stonyhurst Hall, a Jesuit college. Oliver Cromwell spent a night at Stonyhurst and slept on a table in the middle of the Great Hall in full armour because he was afraid of being massacred. Arthur Conan Doyle carved his initials in a desk at the school. While J.R.R. Tolkien's sons were students at Stonyhurst, he spent summers there writing his books. It is said that he used the landscape around Pendle Hill as an inspiration for Middle Earth's Misty Mountain and Lonely Mountain. Tolkien used to go walking and visit a local family hotel, the Shireburn Arms, for a pint. This inspired the idea of the Shire, home of the Hobbits in Lord of the Rings.

PS: So you were born and raised in a sacred landscape?

Fall

JM: Well it certainly has got me thinking. Maybe it is not just the family that you are born into that is our heritage but just as much our connection to the earth? Maybe we need to delve back into our roots. There is an assumption that "primitive" people lacked culture but we are just starting to realize that this is not necessarily the case. If we can accept the idea that the planets up in the sky influence us at the time of birth, why not the vibrations from the earth beneath our feet?

PS: How has this changed your relationship with Astrology?

JM: I am trying to bring in more underpinnings to the courses I teach. For example, I've started to do that with the Rectification course. We are now delving back into how charts were rectified in the past in order to put the process into perspective. Sometimes rectification can become simply a matter of getting computerized software such as Jigsaw software. We think that because we have the computer we can now do all these applications. Galileo, who was born in 1564 attempted rectifying his own birth chart (which is on display in the Galileo Museum in Florence, Italy.) Back then, rectification would have taken a lot of manual skill and we can learn from these old techniques as well as everything we have available today.

Janet's Astrology Background

PS: How did you get interested in Astrology? You have a degree in mathematics. Was Astrology connected to math?

JM: I got interested in Astrology in my teens. We would visit my grandparents in a seaside town in the north of England where there were Gypsy fortune tellers on the beach – all of them called Gypsy Sarah or Gypsy Rose! You could give them your birth information and two weeks later an interpretation would arrive in the mail. That was my first realization that data goes in, an interpretation comes out and someone can put words to that. My father was an engineer so he was interested in it as well from the mathematical point of view.

My next involvement with Astrology came in Toronto when I got my first astrology reading from Mrs. Tessier, shortly before we went to the Himalayas in 1982. When I met her just before lunch one Tuesday, she said, *Here are four copies of my signed books. You will make a good astrologer. Read them and come back tonight - I have a class starting.*

But I'm off to the Himalayas for eight weeks, I protested. It was obvious to her where my priority should lie. So I got the first couple of classes in, then come back after our trip and wrote the exam. We went hiking and when we returned, the books were round from being carried in my duffle bag on the back of a yak. But I took the exam and I passed it. It was after that that I first met Joan Gibbins, who also studied there.

When Mrs. Tessier moved to Florida, Joan started teaching classes. She was trying to set up the Canadian educational organization and I was the secretary. I sort of went along as a by-stander, very much influenced by the vision of Joan and Elaine Pond to set up an organization that was not hooked in to any of the other astrology organizations of the time, but to do something strictly Canadian.

Applying Astrology at Work

When I was working in my corporate life of pension administration, my boss was the CEO. We were moving into some delicate negotiations to make the pension plan a properly functioning independent entity and this took place over the timeframe of a couple of years.

Whenever we had an important meeting I would run a chart of what was happening in the sky beforehand. He would ask me what was going to happen and I would say: *Don't expect anything for the first half hour and then just watch this, this and this.* And it worked out very well. That is not a typical corporate strategy! Over time, we could attribute the participants to each planet. You could see who was playing out the different planets. So we got to know *This is Jupiter at the bottom of the chart and helshe is going to come in at this point. Or someone is going to join forces with somebody else.* So I found out that a chart doesn't just always have to be the soul searching of what you yourself are going to be doing for the next year. On another level, it is practical and in motion.

Teaching

PS: When did you start teaching?

JM: In 1990 I began teaching in the Toronto District School Board continuing education system. The way it worked was that you had to go to your school on registration night and set up your table with everyone else who was offering courses. At 7:00 pm they opened the doors of the school gymnasium and everyone streamed in to sign up for woodworking, knitting, cooking and so forth. And when a course was filled, the teacher packed up and left. Some people would find that that the course they

wanted was full and they would see what else was available. So Astrology was not the first choice of many of the students who ended up in my first classes. They might have been just as interested in crochet!

CAAE President

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When I got more actively involved in CAAE, I managed to move from working full time to part time in my corporate role as the CAAE really had become a full-time job as President. There is only so fast that a group of volunteers, however dedicated, can move.

I saw one of my mandates as trying to gain more visibility for the CAAE. Participating in the Life Fest Convention in 2007 helped to get our name out there. Joan Ann Evelyn, CAAE and I each paid for a third of the cost of the booth. We had a team of volunteers and it was a great first experience.

Internationally, the Richard Tarnas conference in 2008 was another first. We have also had speakers such as Christeen Skinner on Financial Astrology and Sue Tomkins, both from the UK. But my main aim as President was to make sure that we got our first class of graduates through. When they hung out their shingle, you could seriously expect that these people would carry on the torch. With graduates from across Canada (Ontario, British Columbia and Alberta) together with our international connections, I felt the CAAE had taken its first step towards truly becoming a Canadian association.

PS: What are your plans for your newly minted degree?

JM: I am going to carry on with the teaching. I have some ideas for books which may mean I move away from my regular teaching over time, but I always want to maintain the connection with the CAAE. The MA program also has the advantage of placing astrology into a university setting. I have been asked to submit papers on the work I have done which is another area yet to be explored!

I think astrology in general is in a strong place at the moment and teetering on the edge of a breakthrough to much broader audiences. For example, I was asked to appear on Etalk on CTV in late July to comment on the royal birth. Joan Ann Evelyn, Milada Sakic and several other astrologers have been interviewed for an article on astrology by the Toronto Star. And I am hearing that the same thing is happening to astrological communities in many different parts of Canada. There is certainly a great deal of interest out there waiting to be tapped into.

What an inspiration! Janet left me with so much to think about and explore. Why an octagon, sacred structures mirroring landscapes, new ways to think about the ancient world and all that goes on in the heavens. Again, congratulations Janet, and many thanks for all that you have given us.you have given us. 😳





Royal Baby is born... By Anne Massey

Why do we care? With all the disaster news in the media, the simple things hold allure and England a very traditional country still values its royalty. Millions watched the various media coverage, thousands hung around the Hospital and at the gates of the Palace. For one this is a boom for the travel industry. Amidst the frenzy, all the bad news around the globe and with countless astrologers worldwide sitting at their computers waiting for the announcement, the Duchess of York 'was delivered of a baby boy' at 16:24 BST.

As astrologers we are curious, and many want to see the fate of the royalty...will it last beyond the Queen? The eventuality of his ascension to the throne is decades away and chances are that the role of royalty in England keeps changing with the times. Interestingly in most broadcasts and specials about the royal baby astrology was discussed with appropriate words for the Sun sign. Most sources got it right—a Cancer Sun.

We as astrologers have learned that the atmosphere of the day we were born does play out in our lives. This baby will lead a very public life and the chart has to reflect this. We know the baby was born into turbulent times—or does it only seem that way from our myopic viewpoint—many a historical account uses the same words to describe what is going on. We have watched the news about wars and violence, the extreme weather related catastrophes and the unrest in many countries has resulted in massive casualties of life. The economy is not chugging along as we would like, countries would be bankrupt if it weren't for rescue packages.

Interestingly the baby was born post its due date and was physically large, the ruler of the Ascendant Mars is conjunct Jupiter, and that Mars is in the sign of its fall . This might explain both the weight of 8 lbs 6 oz.—that is almost four kilos—and the delayed arrival. Mars in its fall does suggest going against the norm and tradition. Clearly the baby wanted to be a Cancer Sun arriving with the final degree and minutes of the sign. There is something unique about those late degrees that come with a strong drive to accomplish and finish something and potentially the motivation to go with it. There is a sense of urgency, but also the final degree holds the memories of the entire sign. Cancer represents the family; could it mean the last of his lineage? Incidentally Mars is also out of bounds thus not accountable to the Sun, which is interesting when we note its prominence in the dispositor tree (see student corner) and its prominence in the aspect patterns. An out of bounds planet tends to act according to its natural nature feeling unaccountable; while being forced to rely on the resources provided by ruler.

The chart on this page uses whole-sign houses while identifying the ASC and MC. The symbols of the planets within circles are lots of the planets (Hermetic lots) and the colours identify the planets within bounds. The coordinates are for the hospital in the suburb of Paddington in London. Using Placidus houses for the event the signs of Cancer and Capricorn are intercepted in the second and eight houses. If we opt for Koch Houses Leo and Aquarius become intercepted within the third and ninth houses.

Fall

The coordinates for this chart are for the hospital, with our tools and access to data, we can get rather precise with the chart.

The exact degrees, minutes and seconds for the luminaries are also shown in the top left corner of the chart wheel.

Venus in her Element

Venus rules he element of earth (triplicity) by day. In his chart Venus at 0°Virgo 08' is the element ruler of all of his planets and angles-something I don't recall seeing before. His Venus is separating from a conjunction with Regulus-the kingmaker by mere 7 minutes. Venus is the most elevated planet in the chart and happens to rule his lot of fortune and lot of spirit, both in late degrees of Taurus hugging his descendent. Planets at zero degrees need to learn from example and experience how to be and become something that might be missing in their daily experience. An interesting contrast for the royal baby boy. Venus in Virgo is its fall, planets in their fall have to work extra hard in order to accomplish their designated task and lessons. In this chart how to meet the high expectations placed upon him by his birth into royalty. Venus in Virgo is less about getting personal needs and desires met, more about meeting those of others in order to serve. However, his Venus is extremely lucky!

Aspect Patterns

There is a cardinal T-square linked into the grandtrine in water, the electric charge within is Uranus in Aries. The three Cancer planets are involved in both patterns. A grandtrine pattern tends to represent

both talent and ease—the energy within runs like the rapids with force and without letting obstacles hinder its flow. The explosion of energy through the cardinal T-square is potentially through the collective planet—Uranus—we might be looking at a reformer's chart.

Add to this a preponderance of water and earth; a lack air and only that potentially volatile Uranus in fire...the luminaries connect to each other and the Ascendant but not really much anything else. This makes me ponder about the two distinct facets in his personality and approach to life that don't really connect. What a potentially private person this boy will potentially grow up to be—sheltered from the public, which is naturally to be expected yet forced to share his life in the media. I applaud the parents for taking time away from the hungry media, I hope it becomes a habit.



Elements

The element of water is most closely associated with emotions but also with protective instincts. This combined with Mars in a gang, could be someone who will become known for his strong opinions at least privately. Water element is private particularly when we consider that the Ascendant the natural outlet for our personality is in Scorpio. Water is conditional, interested in possibilities—wishful. Water is in addition to being sensitive, vulnerable, sentimental, empathetic, dependent, nurturing, protective, also holds deep memories— retaining most of what they witness in life. People with strong water have an innate ability to identify and understand someone else's feelings and difficulties, compassionate, kind, and caring, but also escapist, stoic, and potentially stolid, chilly, unemotional, matter of fact, philosophical. Too much water can make us overtly emotional, gullible and secretive...

The cardinal mode is emphasized at the expense of the other two modalities. Cardinal has to be with leadership, many a CEO of corporation hails from this sign. Family is the business or corporation—in this instance the firm.

I don't' see this child destined for an easy private life (stating the obvious) being destined to such a public role does not make for an easy upbringing, lots of traditions to uphold, strong family influence and ultimately a life of altruistic service (of course also forced service).

I am certain this chart will be analyzed over the years by numerous astrologers. We will only know about what is made public, and the biggest part of this chart is very private. We might ponder the role of the Ascendant versus the role of the Midheaven for a moment. The Ascendant represents our personal interactions, it is how we look and how we are perceived. We might all agree that a Scorpio rising person is guarded, private and typically enigmatic. It is how we relate one on one. The midheaven represents our public persona, in the prince's chart that is Virgo, ruled by Mercury in Cancer in its own bounds (those of Mercury). The Mercury is in a Phasis condition—a Greek term to identify a planet as capable of rising or setting with the Sun. The condition exists when someone is born within seven days of a station for that planet Mercury stationed direct approx. three days prior to his birth at 13°22'. Mercury as a Morning Star is moving very slowly in his chart (only at 11 minutes per day). Mercury gains power when it is in Phasis, it becomes a significant planet. Mercury also gets points for being in its own bounds.

What are bounds?

Each sign is divided into five segments between the five planets (Sun and Moon don't get ownership or control this way). You can see the approx. division around the chart wheel on page 5. The planets shown in green are in the bounds of Mercury. If we think of the sign as an estate owned by the ruling planet, then the bounds are the parts of the estate with a caretaker or decreed owner; the one that looks after that portion of the bigger property stocking it with his own tools, toys and possessions When we have access to our own tools we tend to be the most productive and feeling comfortable about the energy. Many of the authors from the Hellenistic era, consider a planet in its own bounds being akin to being its own sign—having autonomy and proper tools to carry on the tasks belonging to it. (NB. There are a few variants of the bounds—also known as terms—I use the Egyptian ones).

What a fascinating chart for further study. 😳

Unfortunately, not all of us use our gifts to the best of our abilities, or with the best intent. Nevertheless, we receive energies from the universe during an eclipse that give us what we need. This is a very surprising interpretation of eclipses.

Jan Spiller and Karen McCoy wrote a book called Spiritual Astrology. The looked at prenatal eclipses in thousands of charts and did interviews on the data. They found another angle that helps to enlighten us: the sun signs of our prenatal eclipses reveal how we can use our gifts. Solar eclipses - and its gifts want us to teach others - are similar to someone born under a Sun sign. Jan and Karen found that parents who wish they had better communication in their relationship will often have a child with the Sun in Gemini. This is interesting because when I looked to my friend's son's Sun sign, Cancer – I questioned her about her relationship with her husband, I found out she wished he was home more often, and helped with looking after the kids. Lunar eclipses direct us to teach and learn for ourselves. The houses follow the same idea. The house in which the solar eclipse falls is the area of life where we are meant to teach and share with others. The house with the lunar eclipse is where we must absorb what we have learned in life.'

When reading a client's chart, go back to the time the last solar and lunar eclipse happened. The signs where the eclipses fell help to shape who we are. The energies of a prenatal eclipse influence us and follow us for the rest of our lives.

To quote Karen McCoy: "During an eclipse, the sheath of the Earth is broken, and a surge of energy from the collective higher consciousness enters the planet's atmosphere. This energy is sent as a helping hand. The sign in which the eclipse occurs will determine the type of help that is sent, through the souls who enter at that time and the ability the universe has bestowed on them. How aware and evolved these souls are will determine how well they use their gifts."

I am an astrology student and early in my astrological studies, I encountered the more spiritual side of astrology. I found it very touching that the universe is empathetic and nurturing to us all.

This gave me extra inspiration in my everyday life and hence I wrote this article to share with you.
